### AUTHOR SPOTLIGHT... LINDSAY LITTLESON

Lindsay Littleson has four grown-up children and lives near Glasgow. An ex-primary teacher, she began writing for children in 2014 and won the Kelpies Prize for her first children's novel The Mixed Up Summer of Lily McLean. The Awkward Autumn of Lily McLean and Guardians of the Wild Unicorns are also published by Floris Books.

In 2015 her WWI novel Shell Hole was shortlisted for the Dundee Great War Children's Book Prize and she enjoyed engaging in research so much that she was inspired to write two more historical novels, A Pattern of Secrets and The Titanic Detective Agency.

# THE YEAR 5 AND 6 LIBRARY





This year, we are rolling out a new library system at the school called Junior Librarian. With the help of our fantastic parent volunteers, the books in the upstairs library have now all been labelled and catalogued. Our new library monitors and reading ambassadors have been working hard to organise the library and have undergone training to help the other children check books in and out. Over the next half term, the online system will be rolled out for the children in Year 5 and 6 to use at home. They will be able to browse library books online, write recommendations for others, create reading lists, and reserve books they fancy reading. Best of all, the system will recommend books to the children based on their previous choices, making it easier for them to find their next great read.

Cataloguing and labelling has already gotten underway in the downstairs library, so we are hoping that they too will be joining the online system later in the year. If any parents are interested in helping with this, please let us know via the school office.



# POETRY PROMPTS



'Poetry Prompts' is
Joseph Coelho's flagship
project as the
prestigious Waterstones
Children's Laureate.
Through the campaign,
Joseph aims to break
down the fear often
associated with reading
and writing and show
why poems are for
everyone, alongside the
joy that writing, reading
and performing poetry
can bring to our lives.

From National Poetry Day onwards, Joseph has shared a weekly 'Poetry Prompt' video to inspire the nation, young and old, to write poems and to become poets. Each video sees him exploring a different subject or technique such as similes, onomatopoeia and figurative language. The bite-sized video series – each lasting under ten minutes – is shared on the Book Trust website every Monday morning. "Poetry Prompts is my invitation to the nation, young and old, to become poets. We turn to poetry at weddings, funerals and births because it goes beyond mere words and translates the soul. But there is baggage associated with poetry that I want everyone to put down – to allow everyone to reclaim the birth right of poet. So often I've met children and adults scared to put pen to paper, terrified of 'getting it wrong' – this has repercussions in all aspects of life. I want to show everyone that poetry is for them, that we can enjoy the rules and break the rules."





Foundation and Key Stage One...












Key Stage Two...











# COMPETITION TIME!

500 Words, the UK's most successful children's writing competition, has now opened for submissions and will run till Friday 10 November. This year, the two age categories will be 5-7 year-olds and 8-II year-olds.

Children of all abilities are encouraged to use their creativity and imagination to write a story they would love to read without the pressure of having to worry about spelling, punctuation, and grammar.

BBC Breakfast will be hosting the competition supported by BBC Teach, where you can find all the instructions and resources you will need to enter. The winners will be featured in a special 500 Word programme with The One Show, on World Book Day on 7 March 2024.

#### The Rules

All the stories must:

- Be 500 words or less (title is not included)
- Be written by an individual and not a group
- Be a child's own original idea
- Be prose, not rap or poem



#### Stories must not:

- Give any personal details of the child, including their name
- Recount a historical event (but they can use a real person or historical character as a source of inspiration)


All stories will be judged on the following criteria:




